As we look to the future, I am filled with hope. We are building momentum, and I believe we are on the path to securing a brighter future for Sumatra's orangutans and the forests they call home.



BUILDING ARTIFICIAL CANOPY BRIDGES FOR SUMATRAN ORANGUTANS IN WEST TOBA

Deep in the lush, vibrant rainforests of West Toba, something incredible was happening along the crucial stretch of the Lagan-Pagindar road — an eight-day whirlwind of activity as teams from Vertical Rescue Indonesia and TaHuKah built an artificial canopy bridge.

It wasn't just any construction project: this was a lifeline, crafted to stitch back together the fragmented homes of the region's Sumatran orangutans. These majestic creatures, with their gentle eyes and thoughtful ways, now had a safe path over the dangers of roadways, reuniting them with patches of forest they'd been cut off from.

The folks working on this weren't just any crew-they were a dedicated bunch, many of whom were observing Ramadan. Imagine this: they fasted all day, no food, no water, from sunrise to sunset, yet their spirits never waned. They toiled under the relentless

heat of the sun, often caught off guard by sudden downpours, yet their determination never faltered. It was a true testament to the strength and heart it takes to stand up for our planet.

This new bridge is more than just a way for the orangutans to get from A to B. It's a crucial piece in the puzzle of their survival, letting them roam freely to mingle, mate, and munch across what used to be treacherous divides. It's about keeping the family tree diverse, which is key to keeping them thriving, not just surviving. They can now chase new horizons, find fresh fruit,



and maybe even a new love, all thanks to this aerial pathway. This story also involves the local community, whose knowledge of the forest and wildlife is key in designing and positioning the bridge to function effectively as a safe corridor for animals. However, there is more to it than just a story about installing ropes to build a bridge at the top of a tree.

It's about the human spirit, the strong will to protect and preserve that surpasses even the most severe physical and spiritual tests. This project wasn't just about technical prowess; it was a profound display of commitment to a cause much bigger than any individual.

The canopy bridges were made possible thanks to the generous support of Size of Wales, Asian Species Action Partnership and **Dierenpark Amersfoort Wildlife Fund**. We're so grateful to these funders for helping to ensure wild orangutan populations stay connected.

Now, with these canopy bridges completed, they stand as beacons of hope and as symbols of continuity for the Sumatran orangutans in West Toba. It's a striking reminder of what's possible when human creativity, respect for nature, and an unwavering resolve come together in the quest for conservation. This monumental project marks a significant step toward fostering a more harmonious coexistence between humans and the natural world, ensuring a safer, more connected future for Sumatra's wildlife.

THE BENEFITS OF SOCIAL FORESTRY

Social forestry licences can be issued in several ways, from allowing villages to manage state forest areas, to granting Indigenous communities rights to manage their ancestral forest lands.

- Forest Conservation: By involving local communities in forest management, the scheme aims to enhance forest conservation efforts, reducing illegal logging and deforestation.
- Poverty Alleviation: Providing communities with legal rights to manage forest areas helps improve their livelihoods through the sustainable use of forest resources.
- Community Empowerment: Strengthening the capacity of local communities to manage and benefit from forests promotes social equity and resilience.



CHALLENGES AND OPPORTUNITIES

Indonesia's social forestry scheme has shown promising results in both forest conservation and community development. Over 4.4 million hectares have been designated for social forestry, involving millions of people in sustainable management practices. However, challenges remain, which we – alongside our frontline partners – are helping communities to overcome:

- The licensing process can be very complex; we support communities to navigate this with guidance from Indonesian Social Forestry experts.
- During the licensing process, we support communities to create a robust sustainable forest management plan, and once the licence is secured, enact that plan.
- We help to ensure communities can develop sustainable livelihoods, such as through access to markets for their forest products.



COMMUNITY-CENTRED CONSERVATION

At SOS, we support our partners on the ground in Sumatra to provide a secure future for orangutans, people, and their rainforest homes. At the heart of our approach is a steadfast commitment to Sumatra's rural communities.

We believe that forming open, genuine and long-lasting relationships with local communities is the key to protecting orangutans in the wild. We support community-centred conservation: an approach that listens to the needs of local communities and ensures they have a central role in programme planning and decision-making.

Social forestry presents a unique opportunity to create a win-win situation for people, wildlife and the environment. By investing in this approach, funders can enhance its impact, address challenges and scale up successful models. Ultimately, moving us ever closer to our vision of wild orangutans thriving in resilient forests.

Social forestry: CONSERVATION EETS COMMUNITY ENPOWERMENT

Social forestry is an innovative approach to forest management. It involves local communities in the decision-making process, granting them rights to forest resources. This approach is gaining recognition as a powerful tool for long-term conservation programmes.

WHAT IS SOCIAL FORESTRY?

At its core, social forestry is a partnership between government forest departments and local communities. It aims to transfer management rights of forest land to the communities living alongside these precious ecosystems, empowering them to utilise and conserve forest resources. In Indonesia, the social forestry scheme plays a pivotal role in the nation's strategy to promote sustainable forest management and alleviate poverty. The scheme is an integral component of Indonesia's broader environmental and social development goals, aiming to balance ecological sustainability with community welfare.

SOS AND THE DARWIN INITIATIVE: BUILDING EXPERTISE

This kind of 'nature and people' approach meets SOS's ethos; we know, through over two decades of groundbreaking work, that it's only through working alongside local communities that we can ensure a thriving future for orangutans, rainforests and people alike.

It's important that we empower local communities and professionals to do this work. At SOS we're lucky to have developed strong working relationships with worldwide experts in this kind of work, and we have worked closely for years with our partners in Indonesia to increase capacity to further protect orangutans and their rainforests.

Throughout 2023 and 2024, we hosted a series of workshops to build capacity within our frontline partners' teams in Indonesia. These workshops allow the teams at OIC and TaHuKah to:

- Design and lead strategic conservation programmes to protect, connect and rewild critical orangutan landscapes.
- Effectively engage forest-edge communities in forest-friendly livelihoods which enhance biodiversity and reduce poverty.
- Set the direction and strategy for their own organisations.

This training has given the team members the tools to develop and deliver effective and resilient conservation plans that work with local communities. With this training, the teams will also be able to set their organisation's own goals, to train up new team members, and better expand their work.

TRUSTS AND FOUNDATIONS

The work of the Sumatran Orangutan Society and our frontline ^V partners has been supported by some incredibly generous grants and gifts from Trusts and Foundations this year, providing a stable and reliable source of funding that is often repeated year on year.

Trusts and foundations are an especially important source of funding for us because they reflect a diverse range of funding priorities that we can match to many different aspects of our work, from advocacy and capacity building for forest-edge communities, to forest restoration projects, and innovative approaches to tackling fragmentation of orangutan habitats. Trusts and foundations have been set up to financially support charities like SOS, and their funding is often flexible and adaptable to new challenges and opportunities.

We have been extremely fortunate to receive some unrestricted grants this year that have made it possible for us to plan and ensure we can remain a resilient organisation. This unrestricted support also enables us to respond quickly and where the need is greatest. For example, we were able to use unrestricted funding to top up the generous grants from Asian Species Action Partnership, Dierenpark Amersfoort Wildlife Fund and Size of Wales so that we could complete the new canopy bridges within the West Toba landscape within a short timeframe. We've been delighted to see that these bridges are already being tested out by curious gibbons and langur monkeys.


SOS supports deep and meaningful 'community-centred' programmes to secure a long-term future for Sumatra's orangutans and their forest home. This needs a long-term and flexible approach that is sometimes difficult to secure funding for within existing grants structures. This year we invited our trust and foundation supporters to attend a webinar to explore how funding can be made more accessible for truly transformative projects. A funder toolkit is now in development that we hope will help environmental funders adapt their grants to support programmes that will produce lasting results and create sustainable benefits for biodiversity and local people.


